Message from the Mayor



Summer is approaching and there's already so much we've accomplished this year. Our staff is working hard on key City Council issues like conservative money management, economic development and beautification. Along with our recreational lifestyle and exemplary schools, we know that safe and clean neighborhoods are a big reason many of you choose to

live in League City. We received some nice confirmation of our performance this spring with some recognition from Movoto, who listed League City in two top ten lists: "Best Houston Suburb" and "Most Affordable Houston Suburb". These statistics are based on factors like cost of living, home value, amenities, crime rates, and commute time. Staff and City Council are pursuing their goals and initiatives that were established as strategic priorities for League City at the Envisioning Workshop held earlier this year. Code Enforcement is introducing a renewed interest in beautification as it relates to grass cutting and the overall appearance and cleanliness of our City. We have completed and landscaped the City's new entryway signs to welcome our residents and visitors. We have opened the doors to the newest addition to our recreation facility amenity, the new pool at Hometown Heroes Park. This Z-shaped, 50-meter, Olympic sized pool can accommodate several swim teams at once along with residents all throughout pool season. We're pleased to offer these amenities and resources to our community, and taking care of our resources requires your help. As summer continues and our weather heats up, please remember to conserve water. Our drought contingency plan makes water rationing easy to understand and follow, but we're hoping to avoid using that plan. Please take care as you shower, do laundry, water your yard or wash your car: water is our most precious resource, and it's up to all of us to protect it. Finally I want to remind us all that as we go on in the midst of hurricane season, it is important to remember the many resources we have available on the City's website www.readylc.com.

Hurricane Season 2015

The last few years' Hurricane Seasons have been relatively mild. The position of El Nino near the South American coast and cool Atlantic waters inhibited storm growth last season and look to be the same this year. However, we cannot count on the 2015 Hurricane Season being uneventful! It is important to note that some of Texas most devastating hurricanes have come in years where there was not much activity. The City of League City urges residents to BE INFORMED and BE PREPARED! Remember it only takes one!

Be Informed

League City Emergency Information and Resources

- Storm-related information will be available on League City's website, www.leaguecity.com, www.readylc.com LCTV Channel 16, Facebook and Twitter (you can link to Facebook and Twitter from the city's website).
- Sign up for Blackboard Connect, League City's emergency and public outreach notification system. Blackboard Connect can send informational and emergency messages to home and cell phones, email, and texting devices. Look for this button on the city's website, and register your information.
- If you or someone you know needs assistance evacuating, please call the 2-1-1 Texas Helpline to register. Once registered, the League City Office of Emergency Management will contact you to discuss your needs.

Be Prepared

Create an Emergency Plan

- Hurricane hazards come in many forms – storm surge, high winds, tornadoes, and flooding. This means it is important for your family to have a plan that includes all of these hazards. Visit www.readylc.com and www.ready.gov for information and tips on how you can be better prepared.

Evacuate

- Evacuation is always encouraged, especially for residents with special medical needs.
- Determine where you will go if the city calls for an evacuation. Don't forget to include your pets in the plan.
- Secure your home before you leave.
- Plan to stay where you are for several days while the city restores essential services.
- If you cannot evacuate, be prepared to live without power and water for a week – no matter the size of the storm.

Get the Insurance You Need

- There are separate policies for homeowner, windstorm and flood insurances.
- All residents are encouraged to purchase flood insurance. You do not have to live in a designated floodplain to purchase flood insurance. Windstorm insurance typically does not cover storm surge
- Familiarize yourself with your insurance policies, and address any questions with your agent or company.
- Remember – it typically takes 30 days for insurance policies to be activated, so don't wait!

Progress Report for Cabela's in League City

Construction of southeast Texas' first Cabela's store continues at their site adjacent to Big League Dreams and I-45. The developer's contractor, A-1 Construction, is responsible for all "site" work including utilities, parking lot, landscaping, parking lot lights, driveways, etc. Site work has been ongoing since this past October and should wrap up by the end of the year. The contractor hired by Cabela's to construct the approximately 70,000 square foot retail store, EMJ Construction, recently erected the large outside "tilt" walls and began placing the roof truces. Cabela's states work on the building will continue through this fall, followed by the stocking of the store and training of staff leading to an anticipated early spring 2016 grand opening. The City will continue to provide periodic Cabela's construction updates via the weekly "City Manager's Update" found at www.leaguecity.com.

Water Meter Replacement Begins



Beginning the week of June 8th, water meters throughout the City are being replaced. Customers will be notified via Blackboard Connect one week prior to the meter replacement. You can register for Blackboard Connect on the City's website, www.leaguecity.com. The meters are being replaced by Utiliuse contractors. They will be in a marked vehicle with the Utiliuse logo. Each Utiliuse contractor will be in a uniformed company logo yellow shirt with a city contractor picture ID badge. In addition, all work will be performed outside the customer's location. The process begins with the contractor informing the customer their water will be off for appropriately 15 – 20 minutes. The contractor shuts off the water at the curb stop valve located in the meter box. The radio, affixed to the meter box, is deactivated and the water meter is removed. The new water meter model is installed and the meter radio is reactivated. The contractor then resumes the water service. To release the air bubbles, the contractor will flush the customer's water line outside for 5 to 10 gallons. City Hall in the Park Continues

The August event will take place at Hometown Heroes Park and will feature an open swim/float night at the new pool. Refreshments will be provided.

Golf Carts - Get Your Permit!



Do you own or operate a golf cart in League City? The City of League City has a golf cart ordinance in place intended to provide a safe environment for the responsible operation of motorized carts within the community. As part of the ordinance, golf carts must have a permit. To determine if your golf cart meets the requirements and to schedule an inspection, please visit www.leaguecity.com/GolfCarts.

Requirements for Development

Chapter 50 of the City of League City ordinance requires that all development in the floodplain is properly permitted. Development includes, but is not limited to, any new construction, grading, filling, or paving.

League City participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The City must conform to NFIP standards in order for citizens to be eligible for subsidized flood insurance. The City has adopted flood zone specific standards that exceed the NFIP requirements. These higher regulatory standards reduce flood hazard vulnerability and reduce residential flood insurance premiums.

Building Requirements:

X zone – The top of the lowest floor must be 18 inches above the highest adjacent grade or the crown of the street. A form survey or FEMA Elevation Certificate can serve as documentation.

X500 or Shaded X zone – The top of the lowest floor must be 18 inches above the nearest adjacent base flood elevation, the water level of the 100-year flood. An Elevation Certificate is required at the time of foundation inspection.

AE Zone - The top of the lowest floor must be built 18 inches above base flood elevation.

VE Zone – The bottom of the lowest horizontal structural member (e.g. lowest beam) of the structure must be 18 inches above base flood elevation.

For properties within the AE and VE zones, documentation must be in the form of FEMA elevation certificates. Elevation certificates must be submitted to the City at three times during the construction process for construction in AE and VE zones:

1. Submitted along with construction drawings or permit application. Elevation certificates must show address and map information, elevation of lowest adjacent grade, highest adjacent grade, and proposed lowest floor elevation
2. During construction, before the pouring of the form. This ensures the foundation elevation requirement has been satisfied
3. At finished construction. The elevation certificate must document the lowest floor elevation and all machinery servicing the structure. For both residential and commercial development, all utilities must be elevated to a minimum of 18 inches above base flood elevation.

Substantially Damaged or Improved Structures:

Substantially damaged or improved structures are defined as structures for which the cost of repair (regardless of the cause of damage) or the cost of improvement equals or exceeds 50% of the structure's market value. Substantially damaged or improved structures require both building permits and elevation certificates. Substantially damaged or improved structures are held to the same building standards as new construction.

Cumulative Substantial Improvements/Damage:

A structure within the 100-year floodplain is considered to be substantially damaged or improved if the "cumulative costs of the improvement or damage repairs when combined incrementally over a 10-year period of time, equals or exceeds 50% of the market value of the structure." For structures in the floodplain, this means that the costs of improvements or repairs will be added up over a 10-year period. Once the cumulative cost of improvements or repairs reaches 50% or more of the value of the structure, the structure will be required to comply with current City code. In most cases, compliance means elevating the structure to 18 inches above base flood elevation.

Example:

A home in the AE zone is worth \$100,000. In 2012, the homeowner remodeled the kitchen at a cost of \$10,000. Before remodeling, the homeowner was sure to contact the Building Department and obtain proper permits. In 2014, the homeowner wishes to get a permit to build an addition to the house. The cost of the addition is \$45,000. At this point, the cumulative cost of improvements is \$55,000. This cost exceeds 50% of the value of the structure. Now considered Substantially Improved, the structure must be elevated to 18 inches above base flood elevation. The homeowner may initially balk at the cost of elevating the home. However, after elevating the structure, the homeowner will enjoy reduced flood insurance premiums and reduced flood vulnerability in the future.

The Certified Floodplain Managers at the City Building Department can make site visits and can offer site-specific flood data. Please contact the League City Building Department before any construction in the floodplain to ensure that all regulations are satisfied. Development in the floodplain without a permit is illegal and should be reported to the City. 


Adult and Teen Summer Reading



There will be live music and plenty of live entertainment. All concessions will be FREE! Bring your patriotic spirit and celebrate this special day with us.

CONCERTS / MOVIES IN THE PARK

Welcome to our Concerts and Movies in the Park! The entertainment you're about to enjoy combines a year's worth of work by the Parks Recreation Department, the support of our Mayor and City Council, and the talents of our entertainers. So, sit back, relax, and enjoy. Feel free to bring your lawn chairs and picnic blankets but please remember glass containers are prohibited in all City parks. Food and refreshments will be available for purchase. Concerts and movies are held at the League Park Plaza from 7:00pm – 10:00pm on selected Saturday evenings throughout the summer. Concerts will begin at 7:00pm with the movie beginning at sunset. Scheduled dates are July 11, July 25, and August 8.

GIRLS ASA SOTBALL

The League City Parks Recreation Department is preparing for its girl's ASA Fall Softball Program. The program will be open to girl's ages 5-18. There are six (6) separate age divisions for this program.

Games will start in mid- September and finish in mid to late November. All games will be played on the weekends. Games will be played at the Chester L. Davis Sportsplex (1251 Highway 96), or at parks in other participating cities.

After a fantastic season of basketball in League City and qualifying for the Texas Amateur Athletic Federations (TAAF) state tournament at Regionals, the League City 12U Division II basketball team, The LC Legends, coached by Mr. McGuire, Mr. Dry, and Mr. Gonzalez went the distance on March 21st, 2015 at the state championship tournament in Waco, Texas!
