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As we approach League City's 50th year, it is time to reflect and give thanks to all the mayors and council members that have preceded us. I am honored to lead our city into its next half-century. We have grown and flourished to become Galveston County's largest city with a population of more than 85,000 as we enter 2012. Among those who deserve thanks are our dedicated city employees who, week in and week out, work hard to move League City forward. There

are many challenges with a fast-growing community. These dedicated servants are meeting them head-on. Be it water, sewer, roads, parks, fire, EMS or police, we're working hard to make sure you get top-quality services at a reasonable cost. We have taken great strides in planning and addressing the needs of our city in a systematic and cost-effective manner. You want the most from your tax dollars, and we're making it happen. Council this year reduced property taxes by more than half a cent, the second straight cut in your League City property tax rate. While we hold your tax bills down, we're still focused on service quality. With League City's rapid growth, we have had to rush to make sure infrastructure can handle new development. At the height of the last housing boom, League City saw more than 1,500 housing starts annually. After the market crashed, we dropped to about 500, and we're now back to about 700 new homes per year. The slowdown gives us a chance to better plan and manage our growth so we



don't get behind the eight-ball again on issues like traffic or water supply. In the last four years, we have crossed numerous things off the city's bucket list: a new overpass at League City Parkway, expansion of the Dallas Salmon Wastewater Treatment Plant, construction of the Southwest Water Reclamation Facility, a new comprehensive plan and new master plans for water and transportation, to name a few. We have numerous road projects in the works, along with new parks and trails. And since mid-year, when we assumed responsibility for traffic signals in League City, we've achieved an 18 percent average reduction in travel times along FM 518 between Bay Area Boulevard and Columbia Memorial Parkway. Soon, you will see us add a blinking yellow arrow at some intersections; this will allow turning when it is clear to do so, without having to wait exclusively for a green arrow. While we improve infrastructure to meet our community's needs, we must also look at our municipal facilities. Our main city complex is

aging and needs serious repairs. We are tackling this by upgrading key mechanical and energy systems to bring them up to code and increase their efficiencies. Rather than spend \$30 million on a new city hall, we are renovating at a fraction of the cost. But there is much more to do. Our police building is undersized and equipped with outdated technology. Even with a renovated City Hall, we don't have enough room for the staff needed to serve a growing city, so we're compelled to rent expensive office space. Despite our successes, these and other challenges await. As we begin another year, your staff and elected representatives are dedicated to giving you the best possible service at the best possible price while humbly giving thanks to those who preceded us, and building on the strong foundation that's been left to us. Thank you for the opportunity to serve.

CITY COMES IN UNDER BUDGET FOR 2011

Heeding calls for more conservative use of public funds, League City underspent its operating budget by about 2.5 percent for the 2011 fiscal year.

The City's general and utility funds, which include the funding for most of League City's operations, finished the year with Council-approved budgets totaling \$78.58 million. Total spending for the two budgets totaled \$76.61 million, nearly \$2 million underbudget.

Leftover funds are to roll into the general and utility fund balances, which work much like savings accounts or "rainy day" funds, providing a reserve that helps cushion against unexpected costs or drops in revenue, and is also used to pay for one-time major investments in items like equipment or technology.

"I'm proud of the work our City employees have done, and the way they've adjusted to our new focus on holding costs down

and managing taxpayers' money more carefully," said Acting City Manager Rich Oller. "Our costs for utilities, fuel and other essentials go up just like everyone else's, but our staff found smarter, less expensive ways to meet our operating goals and deliver world-class customer service to our residents and businesses."

"This shows the discipline and conservative principles our City is using to manage public funds," added Mayor Tim Paulissen, who was among the members of Council supporting a property tax cut for the second straight year in fiscal year 2012, which began October 1. "The cuts we're making are incremental steps, but they add up to more money in the pockets of League City taxpayers. Better service at a lower cost is the kind of performance that should make any business or City Hall proud, and I congratulate our Council and staff on their hard work toward this goal."

LEAGUE CITY INSTALLS GALVESTON COUNTY'S FIRST FLASHING YELLOW ARROW SIGNAL

The League City Traffic and Transportation Department will begin installing new left turn signals along FM 518 from Columbia Memorial Parkway to Country Lane. This is the first phase of a four phase program that will also include the SH 96 Corridor, the FM 2094 Corridor, and the FM 646 Corridor. This turn signal is one of a series of signals that will be installed along FM 518 to allow for permissive left turns. This program is being implemented to continue the improvement of traffic flow along the City's major arterials. The new signal implementation will decrease left turn wait time off of the major arterials where the new signals are implemented.

The program consists of replacing some of the current signals that only allow for protected left turns with signals that allow for both protected and permissive left turns. This new traffic signal head is called a flashing yellow arrow signal head. The flashing yellow arrow signal head operates as follows:

Green Arrow – left turns are protected; left turn can be made because opposing traffic is stopped.

Flashing Yellow Arrow – left turns are permissive, left turn can be made after yielding to opposing traffic and to pedestrians.

Solid Yellow Arrow – caution should be used and the motorist should prepare to stop because the traffic signal will soon turn red.

Solid Red Arrow – motorist should stop.

Installation of the new flashing yellow arrow signals will begin at Magnolia Estates/Claremont on December 6, 2011. Installation will move back to the east to Columbia Memorial Parkway and move westward. Installation will take place at the following intersections in addition to Columbia Memorial and Magnolia Estates/Claremont:

The installation of all of the new signals along FM 518 should be complete by the end of January of 2012.

LEAGUE CITY TRAFFIC AND TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT CONSTRUCTS ITS FIRST TRAFFIC IN-HOUSE TRAFFIC SIGNAL

The League City Traffic and Transportation Department (Traffic) has begun construction on the City's first in-house traffic signal project. The traffic signal is being constructed to replace the existing multi-way (four-way) stop at the intersection of Lawrence Road and Village Way. This intersection is located at the entrance to Clear Creek Independent School District's Education Village.

Field observations at the beginning of the school year indicated problems with this multi-way stop and the intersection of SH 96 and Lawrence Road. Modifications were made to the signal timing at SH 96 and Lawrence Road to help improve entering and exiting of vehicles to the three schools. This improved the congestion created by school arrivals in the morning and school departures in the afternoon. However, the full benefits

of the improvements could not be felt unless police officers were placed at the multi-way stop to direct traffic and feed the traffic light at SH 96 and Lawrence Road. After extensive observations, it was determined that a traffic light in place of the multi-way stop would allow for better operations and for the full benefits of the new signal timing to be achieved.

Plans were developed to install a temporary traffic signal using wood poles at the intersection of Lawrence Road and Village Way. Included with the installation of the new traffic light, a pan/tilt/zoom camera will be installed at the intersection of SH 96 and Lawrence Road. This camera will allow Traffic staff to monitor school traffic at both intersections. Wireless communication is also being installed for communication.

This includes the installation of antennas and radios on the South Shore Harbor water tower and the Amegy Bank building, in the traffic signal cabinets at the intersections of SH 96 and Lawrence Road and Lawrence Road and Village Way; and in the four school zone flashers located along SH 96 for Education Village. These radios will all Traffic staff to monitor traffic and signal operations remotely.

Construction began on this project the week of Thanksgiving, and is being constructed by the Traffic and Transportation Department in conjunction with the Streets Department, the Planning Department, and Republic ITS (maintenance contractor). Construction completion and traffic signal turn on is scheduled for mid-January, 2012.

TIPS FROM MIKE AND THE MECHANICS VEHICLE MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT

With the colder weather here, most of us have packed away our summer clothes and have gotten out our warmer ones. This is also a great time to get your car or truck ready for the cooler weather ahead, and it doesn't have to be a big hassle. We have put together some ideas that just might help give you a peace of mind as you drive into winter months.

Check your antifreeze; overtime antifreeze can lose its effectiveness, so you should change it at least every two years. If you didn't get a chance to do it last year, do it this year. Check your owner's manual for the proper mixture and type to use. Most are half water and half antifreeze, but if you're not sure ask a mechanic.

Check your fluids; as any good mechanic will tell you, by checking your fluids regularly (once a month) you'll save yourself from a possible headache in the future and save money too. Keep your maintenance current in your vehicle; change your engine oil about every 3000 miles and your transmission fluid about every two years. Don't forget your other fluid levels like your power steering, brake, and battery fluids. Fill these to the recommended levels. Last, don't leave out your windshield washer fluid; do not dilute this since in cold weather this will cause it to freeze.

Check your battery; the average life of a battery is about 3 ½ years. Most have a date on the top, but if you're not sure or you can't remember, it's probably time to replace. Have a technician check it out, or buy an inexpensive battery hydrometer and test it yourself. This preventive maintenance might seem a bit costly, but towing and then paying for a new battery will cost even more.

Check your lights; Accidents can occur if you can't see where you're driving, or if the other driver can't see you, especially as we approach winter's short days and long nights.

Check you tires; Cold air will cause the air in your tires to contract and they may be a little low. Check your tread, if your tires are worn, get some new ones. Make sure that you have a spare (with air) and a jack in your trunk.

Check your brakes; make sure that they're functioning to their optimum level. In winter it's possible that the roads may be slippery, wet and possibly icy, you'll want your brakes to be able to handle the roads if this occurs.

Check your Boots; no not the ones on your feet; front wheel drive vehicles equipped with CV (constant velocity) joints should have the boots checked for rips and cracks. When the joints are exposed damage can occur. Replacing a joint can cost hundreds of dollars, but replacing a boot is a small fraction of that.

Rubber parts under your hood need maintenance, too. Radiator, heater and vacuum hoses, among others, should be checked for cracks and bulges. Check all belts too.

Yes, it's true that the weather here in Texas normally stays above freezing, but there's still that possibility so why not be prepared.

YOUR TAX DOLLARS HARD AT WORK · PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT TACKLES MULTIPLE PROJECTS



The streets and maintenance are a huge responsibility in our City. The repair of these streets are extremely important to maintain safe traveled ways for our citizens.

SAFE COOKING TIPS FROM THE OFFICE OF THE LEAGUE CITY FIRE CHIEF, BRAD GOUDIE

The kitchen can be one of the most hazardous rooms in the home if you don't practice safe cooking behaviors. Here are some safety tips to help:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.
- Stay alert! To prevent cooking fires, you have to be alert. You won't be if you are sleepy, have been drinking alcohol, or have taken medicine that makes you drowsy.
- Keep anything that can catch fire - potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, towels, or curtains - away from your stovetop.
- Keep the stovetop, burners, and oven clean.
- Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking. Loose clothing can dangle onto stove burners and catch fire if it comes into contact with a gas flame or electric burner.
- Plug microwave ovens and other cooking appliances directly into an outlet. Never use an extension cord for a cooking appliance, as it can overload the circuit and cause a fire.

If You Have a Cooking Fire

- When in doubt, just get out. When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number after you leave.
- If you do try to fight the fire, be sure others are already getting out and you have a clear path to the exit.
- Always keep an oven mitt and a lid nearby when you are cooking. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan (make sure you are wearing the oven mitt). Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. To keep the fire from restarting, leave the lid on until the pan is completely cool.
- In case of an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed to prevent flames from burning you or your clothing.
- If you have a fire in your microwave

oven, turn it off immediately and keep the door closed. Never open the door until the fire is completely out. Unplug the appliance if you can safely reach the outlet.

- After a fire, both ovens and microwaves should be checked and/or serviced before being used again.

If a smoke alarm sounds during normal cooking, you may need to move it farther away from the kitchen (according to manufacturer's instructions) and/or install a smoke alarm with a pause button. If your alarm already has a pause button, push the pause button, open the door or window, and fan the area around the alarm with a towel to get the air moving. Do not disable the smoke alarm or take the batteries out! Treat every smoke alarm activation as a likely fire and react quickly and safely to the alarm.

Most burns associated with cooking equipment, cookware, and tableware are not caused by fire or flame. In 2009, ranges or ovens were involved in an estimated 17,300 thermal burn injuries seen in U.S. hospital emergency rooms.

Microwaves are a leading cause of scald burns. Be extra careful when opening a heated food container. Heat food in containers that are marked 'microwave safe.' Since foods heat unevenly in the microwave, make sure you stir and test the food before eating.

Children under five face a higher risk of non-fire burns associated with cooking than of being burned in a cooking fire. (You can help prevent these injuries by following a few basic tips:

- Keep children at least 3 feet away from where food and drink are being prepared or carried.
- Keep hot foods and liquids away from the table or counter edges.
- Use the stove's back burners if you have young children in the home.
- Never hold a child while cooking, drinking, or carrying hot foods or liquids. Also, teach children that hot things burn!

COMING SOON TO YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD-CURBINLETS

In the near future, City Staff will be seen applying these markers to all roadway curb inlets. These markers are being placed as a reminder that we, as stewards of the Nation's waterways, are not to introduce pollutants such as yard clippings, oil, and fertilizers into the City's storm water drainage system which discharges into our streams, creeks, bayous, and lakes.
