- Check out www.ReadyLC.com, League City's emergency preparedness website. It's got all the information you need to prepare your home and family for hurricanes and other hazards that can impact our area.

- Storm-related information will be

available on League City's website, www.leaguecity.com, LCTV Channel 16, and League City's Facebook and Twitter sites.

- Sign up for Blackboard Connect, League City's emergency and public outreach notification system. Blackboard Connect can send informational and emergency messages to home and cell phones, email, and texting devices. Look for this button on the League City website, and register your information.

- If you or someone you know needs assistance evacuating, please call the 2-1-1 Texas Helpline to register. Once registered, the League City Office of Emergency Management will contact you to discuss your needs.

Be Prepared

Create an Emergency Plan

Hurricane hazards come in many forms – storm surge, high winds, tornadoes, and flooding. That's why it is important for your family to have a plan that addresses all of these hazards.

Evacuate

- Evacuation is always encouraged, especially for residents with disabilities and other access and functional needs.

- Determine where you will go if League City officials call for an evacuation. Don't forget to include your pets in the plan.

- Plan to stay where you are for several days while essential services are restored.

- If you cannot evacuate, be prepared to live without power and water for a week – no matter the size of the storm

Get the Insurance You Need

- There are separate policies for homeowners, windstorm, and flood insurances.

- All residents are encouraged to purchase flood insurance. You do not have to live in a designated floodplain to purchase flood insurance.

- Familiarize yourself with your insurance policies, and address any questions with your agent or company.

- Remember – it typically takes 30 days for insurance policies to be activated, so don't wait!

Message from the Mayor,



As a new City Council begins its work in League City, and I assume the office of Mayor, I reflect on how far our city has come already. We've gone from a small town to the largest city in Galveston County—and League City's still growing strong.

I appreciate the work of my predecessor, Toni Randall, and my council colleagues of recent years. Along with our city's staff, they've given

us long-range planning for financial stability and infrastructure. They've also improved our web presence and technology for communicating with citizens. These improvements provide a strong foundation.

The Mayoral election offered competing visions of the relationship between our elected officials and our professional staff. I argued that Council must provide strong, active oversight of the city's operations, and that our operations should reflect our residents' fiscal conservatism. We now have a responsibility to do the hard work necessary to implement that vision.

I'm committed to working constructively together to tackle the challenges coming League City's way. Our economy is still threatened by cuts at NASA, and local budgets are losing some state funding. Along with ramping up our economic development efforts, we must respond by making sure you get the services you want and need at the best possible value, so you keep more of your own money. We took a good step in that direction by reducing our tax rate last year, but I believe there's more to trim in our City's budget, and I'll work hand-in-hand with our elected and appointed leadership to find savings.

We must improve our working relationship with other area government organizations. League City's a growing part of the Houston-Galveston area, and we must assume a leadership role with our school districts, county government, and state and federal legislatures. These relationships can provide the

partnerships we need to help solve our water and mobility issues in the years ahead.

Finally, we must focus on preserving quality of life in League City. We must develop and enforce a strong neighborhood protection ordinance to prevent oil drilling and industrial activities near homes and schools. We must ensure that our city does not provide a haven for illegal immigrants. And we must make sure that new growth does not come at the expense of those already here.

Thanks to Toni Randall and former councilmembers Mike Barber and Neil Baron for their service to League City. And congratulations to new councilmembers Becker, O'Keefe and Mann. With them and other members of Council, we'll keep working to make sure League City remains not just a place we live, but a place we love.

LEAGUE CITY FIRE MARSHAL : FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Every day, we hear the stories and see the videos and pictures of tragic, heartbreaking devastating losses due to FIRE. More often than not, the fires are occurring in single family homes and commercial apartment complexes. As the fire marshal in my community, we have developed a very good inspection program for our commercial businesses, office buildings, schools, nursing homes, and commercial day care centers. I have jurisdictional authority to demand that fire code violations be abated and that buildings are constructed and maintained according to a nationally published adopted fire code. But, our fires are not occurring in commercial properties, they are occurring in our homes! I have NO authority (or very limited ability) to inspect or require fire code violations be corrected. After all, "a man's home is his castle". Fire does not care what kind house you have or how much money you make, it does not care if you are young or old, it does not care which church you attend – it can happen to ANYONE! The Office of the Fire Marshal will inspect your home at your request; however, for the greater good to the community as a whole, I offer the following Home Fire Inspection Checklist. PLEASE take a few minutes, correct any issues you may find and help me help you provide a safe place for your family to live.

FIRE PREVENTION:

SMOKING HABITS:

- Are all matches and lighters kept out of children's reach?
- Is "NO SMOKING IN BED" a rule in your home?
- Is your family aware that ash trays should never be emptied into waste baskets?
- Are there plenty of large, safe ash trays throughout the house?
- Do you check for smoldering cigarette butts in the furniture?

ELECTRICAL HAZARDS:

- Are appliances checked periodically for good operating conditions?
- Are you careful not to run extension cords under rugs or over hooks and nails?
- When using extension cords for appliances, does the gauge of both cords match?
- Are electrical outlets overloaded?

HOUSEKEEPING:

- Do you keep rubbish cleaned out of attics, garages and yards?
- Is paint kept in tightly closed metal containers?
- Are flammable liquids stored in safety cans and kept away from heat and children?
- Have you made it a rule to NEVER use flammable liquids for cleaning clothes or start fires?

- Are oily rags kept in a tightly sealed container?
- Is your clothes dryer vent clean and properly installed?

HEATING AND COOKING:

- If you have a fireplace, is a screen always placed in front of it?
- Is the filter for your forced air heater changed yearly and the venting cleaned?
- Are furnaces and wood burning stoves in good repair and located away from combustible walls and ceilings?
- Do you have the fireplace chimney cleaned and checked periodically?
- Do you make sure combustibles are not stored near the stove, heater or fireplace?
- Do your children keep a safe distance from flame and heat source s?

OUTSIDE:

- Have all dried grass cuttings, tree trimmings and weeds been removed from your property?
- Are your house numbers VISIBLE from the street?

SMOKE ALARMS:

- Have you installed a smoke alarm outside every sleeping area or in every bedroom on each floor?
- Do you test your smoke alarm(s) every month?
- Do you replace the battery of your battery operated smoke alarm every year?

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS:

- Do you have a UL or FM approved fire extinguisher in your home and garage?
- Do you take it out two times a year and shake it to keep the powder from packing?

FIRE ESCAPE PLAN:

- Does your family have a fire escape plan prepared?
 - Is your escape plan posted and practiced regularly?
 - Does every bedroom have TWO exits? (window and door)
 - Do you have a meeting place so you will know everyone is outside and safe?
 - Are emergency response numbers (9 1 1) posted on all telephones?
 - Do all family members know how and when to call 9 1 1 ?
 - Do you show your babysitter/guests your home escape routes, location of your meeting place, and review 9 1 1 with him/her?
 - Does your family (babysitter/houseguests, etc.) know the first rule in fire emergencies: GET EVERYONE OUT FAST AND DON'T GO BACK INSIDE?
- Please contact us if we can be of further assistance as you improve the fire safety aspects of your home for your family.

Irrigation

- Adjust programmable irrigation controller/ settings for each season
- Set controller/timer to water between 12:00 am and 5:00 am

- Install rain sensor with irrigation system
- Water less frequently but for longer periods
- Turf grass only needs 1 inch of water per week. Perform the "tuna can test" to see how long your irrigation system needs to run. See www.leaguecity.com/planning "Bee" Green-Water Conservation for details
- Water turf grass only when you can see your footprints in it
- Cycle through system once or twice a month to ensure system is functioning properly and there are no broken heads or overspray onto concrete and other impervious surfaces



Landscaping


- Apply 3 inches of mulch around trees and in planting beds
 - Reduce turf grass areas
 - Choose native or xeriscape plants that require less water

Water Conservation Inside

- Faucet aerators are devices that mix air with water. They give you good pressure while using less water.
- Install low flow toilet(s) to save water to save money

Save Water While Preparing Food

- After cooking vegetables or pasta, place the colander inside a larger bowl so you can save the drained water. Use this to water container plants or outside flower pots.



WATER CONSERVATION MEASURES

The City of League City would like to extend appreciation to all residents and businesses that are voluntarily conserving water. This summer the City was forced to initiate the water rationing requirements of the Drought Contingency Plan. The water supply has been used heavily during the drought conditions League City has faced.

The City's average daily water supply, under perfect conditions, is 21.5 million gallons per day. This includes water supplied from the City of Houston, Gulf Coast Water Authority and three City owned and operated groundwater well. Two of these wells are in bad condition and are not capable of providing the rated production they once did. The City is currently taking steps to replace these wells with new wells by late summer.

Over the past month the average water use has been approximately 16.6 million gallons per day with several peak days reaching higher than 17 million. The majority of this water was used for irrigation. Not only has irrigation increased during these drought conditions, but the League City Water Department has been actively seeking other high uses within the system.

Several amenity ponds were directly linked to the City's distribution system allowing water to keep the ponds full using a float valve mechanism. The majority of these ponds were being filled without the prior knowledge of the City. This water use wastes millions of gallons of drinking water each year.

Hydrant flushing by the City has also been curtailed. This practice also wastes valuable drinking water. However, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality requires monthly flushing of dead end mains. League City has worked out a plan with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to reduce the flushing operations. All dead end mains are now being connected to other lines to eliminate the situation.

Why is this an important issue for the entire community? Inefficient use of City drinking

water reduces the amount of water available for domestic use and also reduces the firefighting capability within the City. If all 21.5 million gallons of water were available and delivered and resident and businesses use 16.5 million that leaves only 5 million in reserve for fighting a major structure fire. In order to ensure that adequate pressures exist, and an adequate water supply is available during such a circumstance, several areas within the community would need to be shut down to re-direct the water to the area fighting the fire.

What is currently being done to correct this water problem? Negotiations are ongoing with the City of Houston, Gulf Coast Water Authority and other member cities in the coalition making up the Southeast Water Treatment Plant in Houston to acquire additional water for League City. In addition, the design phase of a new water connection on Beamer Road is nearing completion, and will soon be advertised for bids for construction. This would bring another five million gallons a day into our existing system. Other major improvements in pumping capacity and storage are ongoing to provide the City with the much needed capacity to store more water in the City and to move it more efficiently to high demand areas.

Also, several projects are slated for this summer to extend lines into areas to use treated effluent (reclaimed water) from our Dallas-Salmon plant for irrigation purposes. Supplementing large users of irrigation water with reuse water will extend the useful life of the City's drinking water.

Water is a treasured commodity in all Texas cities. Water should be protected and used efficiently, not wasted, certainly not in the drought conditions that exist today. The City's website has numerous water conservation ideas on how everyone can become better stewards of our water resources. Please help in strengthening our efforts to become a more water wise community.

FLOOD INSURANCE RATES REDUCED FOR RESIDENTS LIVING IN FLOODPLAINS

In May, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) notified the City that League City's Community Rating System (CRS) score had been reclassified from a Class 9 to a Class 8. As a result of the City's reclassification, policyholders of flood insurance within floodplains will receive an additional 5% premium reduction (for a total of 10%) for newly issued and renewed policies after May 1, 2011. Policyholders of flood insurance outside of floodplains will continue to have a 5% premium reduction.

The City of League City voluntarily participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and the Community Rating System (CRS). The NFIP provides federally backed flood insurance that encourages communities to enact and enforce floodplain regulations. The CRS program provides insurance premium rate reductions to policy holders of flood insurance in communities that implement activities that work towards reducing riverine flood damage. To be recognized in the insurance rating system, community floodplain management activities must be described, measured, and evaluated.

This reclassification was the result of a Floodplain/CRS Team, formed by city staff, consisting of members from the Office of Emergency Management and the Building, Planning, and Engineering Departments. The team performed activities such as regular city-wide floodplain notices, maintaining documentation of past and current floodplain updates as well as enforcing building and development criteria that meet or exceed the minimum floodplain requirements. Currently, the team is vigorously pursuing additional credits to further decrease the City's classification and floodplain insurance premiums by revising the City's Drainage Plan, moving structures out of the floodplain and partnering with other agencies on projects that affect League City's drainage system.

LEAGUE CITY ASSUMES TRAFFIC SIGNAL LIGHT MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION

Based upon the 2010 Federal Census, League City has grown to a population over 83,000. State law requires cities that exceed a population of 50,000 by federal census to assume the maintenance and operation of all traffic equipment on State roadways within the City limits.

On June 1, 2011, the City of League City assumed the maintenance and operation of approximately 60 traffic signals, 8 advance warning flashing beacons, and 29 school zone flashers from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

COMMERCIAL VEHICLE ENFORCEMENT



Protecting League City's citizens isn't only just about speeding tickets and catching bad guys. The League City Police Department is also committed to providing a safe environment for residents, and one of the ways that is accomplished is through the Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Program. The program, which began in 2007, consists of two highly trained officers who work to ensure that large commercial vehicles comply with federal, state and local laws and regulations. These officers conduct 5 different levels of inspections on 18-wheelers and other commercial vehicles for issue such as load securement, weight, brakes, steering, hazardous materials and driver requirements.

League City is the first municipality in Galveston County, and one of only three in the county, that provides these services. League City's CVE officers performed 1,300 inspections in 2010. Of those, 5,500 violations were found and 40% of the vehicles inspected were removed from service due to violations. "While you may feel some sympathy for the truck driver who is forced to pull over and endure an inspection, you may think twice once you're enlightened on some of the violations," said Officer Leonard Fletcher. Fletcher says he has come across trucks with faulty brakes and even a truck carrying an unsecure load with a huge marble stone that could have fallen off, and not only damaged a car, but seriously hurt a driver or passenger. "Your friends and family members are sharing the road with these commercial vehicles. We know that you want them to return home safely and that's what we focus on when we're inspecting these vehicles," said Officer Greg Morgan.

Safety isn't the only benefit of enforcing these regulations. Overweight trucks cause damage to roadway surfaces creating potholes, and those that exceed length requirements could impede traffic or strike objects such as posts, street signs and fire hydrants.

SIGN REGULATIONS: ARE YOU FOLLOWING THEM?

Since we are in the heart of the garage sale season we thought it might be appropriate to review the recently approved rules for posting garage sale signs. City Council has adopted the rules to ensure city byways are kept clean and clutter free and to ensure that signs do not impede traffic safety through the area. Signs should be no more than six (6) square feet in area and no more than three (3) feet high. The maximum number of signs per lot is two (2) and all signs should be located outside of the right-of-way. The right-of-way is generally the area of land between the pavement of the street and the sidewalk, if there is no sidewalk then it's typically the area of land between the pavement of the street and the utility poles.
